- Install storm windows if your windows are only single pane.
- · Seal cracks with caulk and weatherstripping. Our store at energysavers.waltonemc.com has everything you need.

HOW YOU CAN HELP YOUR AIR CONDITIONER

- · Use box and ceiling fans to circulate air for a wind chill effect. Then set the air conditioner thermostat to a higher temperature.
- · Make sure its vents are free of rugs, furniture and other obstructions.
- Change the filter regularly. Visit filterchange.waltonemc.com for free reminders.
- Remove debris or items from around the outdoor unit.
- Have a licensed contractor check the unit.

Tangy Tomato Slices

1 cup vegetable oil

1/3 cup vinegar

- 1/4 cup minced fresh parsley
- 3 tablespoons minced fresh basil or 1 tablespoon dried basil
- 1 tablespoon sugar

1 teaspoon salt

- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 medium sweet onion, thinly sliced
- 6 large tomatoes, thinly sliced

Mix the first 9 ingredients. Layer onion and tomatoes in a shallow glass dish and cover with marinade. Cover the dish and refrigerate for several hours. Serves 12.

For the sixth year, students from all corners of Walton EMC's 10-county service area are the recipients of college scholarships from Walton Electric Trust.

More than 170 applicants vied for \$159,000, with 33 being selected for the full scholarship of \$4,000. The Trust board also awarded 27 runner-up scholarships of \$1,000 each.

In determining the winners, the scholarship committee looks for dedication to community, a strong work ethic, extracurricular involvement and triumph over obstacles and hardships. Recommendations from teachers and other adults involved in the students' lives are also considered.

Walton EMC is able to award these scholarships because of unclaimed refunds. After efforts are exhausted to find the rightful owners, the money goes into an endowment provided for by Georgia law. Earnings from the endowment fund the yearly awards.

Since its inception, the program has awarded 250 scholarships worth \$621,750.

Once again, your co-op's line technicians made good showings at the annual Georgia Lineman's Rodeo near Fort Valley.

Apprentice Line Technician Adam Simmons captured first place honors in the overall apprentice division, EMC apprentice division and written test for the second time in three years. Apprentice Jonathan Brooks placed third in both the written test and obstacle course, while Apprentice Ben Campbell placed second in the obstacle course and sixth in the overall apprentice division.

The rodeo is an annual event that tests line technicians' skill and knowledge in performing electrical line work. Journeymen compete on three-man teams while apprentices compete individually.

Practice and preparation for the event increases the competitors' efficiency and safe work habits during everyday tasks.
