

Q: Is it OK to plant shrubs to hide the "green box" in my yard?

A: Walton EMC transformers, commonly called "green boxes," are found in neighborhoods where power lines are buried underground. They are a key part of the system that delivers electricity to you and your neighbors.

Planting bushes, trees or flowers too close to these boxes is not permitted. The same goes for building a fence or placing an object to hide the transformer. Don't cover this equipment in any way.

Plants or objects can hamper Walton EMC crews from accessing a transformer in the case of an outage or emergency. An outage will last longer if vegetation has to be cut or removed before a box is opened.

Adequate space is also needed for air circulation around transformers. Allowing heat to escape during hot weather extends the life of the equipment.

Maintain a clearance of at least 10 feet from the sides and backs of underground transformers. Don't plant anything directly in front (the side with the lock).

Electric Bikes are Booming

Another overseas trend is power pedaling its way into American hearts. Unit sales of electric bicycles (e-bikes), long popular in Europe and China, outpaced those for electric and hybrid vehicles combined last year, reports the Light Electric Vehicle Association.

WHAT TO KNOW:

They're battery powered. E-bikes are equipped with a battery-assisted electric motor for an extra boost while riding.

You have options. Whether you enjoy riding challenging bike trails or want to cruise around the neighborhood park, there is an e-bike model to fit your criteria and budget. A well-rated, adult-size bike starts around \$1,000.

It's a good source of exercise. A study from Brigham Young University public health professors found pedal-assist bikes can provide essentially the same level of workout as conventional bikes.

No license required. In Georgia, the same rules of the road apply to both e-bikes and conventional bicycles. E-bikes are not subject to the registration, licensing or insurance requirements that apply to motor vehicles.

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

You can pick up the traditional bucket of gifts, vote on directors and approve the minutes of the 2021 meeting.



Guard Against Cybercrime

Criminals are getting better at using their computers to steal from you. The FBI estimates Americans lost more than \$4.2 billion to cybercrime in 2020.

Take these steps to improve safeguards against data breaches that can lead to the loss of money or the theft of personal, financial and medical information.

Opt in to multi-factor authentication.

Instead of asking for only a password — which can be reused or stolen — your email, bank, social media, online stores and streaming accounts will verify it's you by asking for two forms of information.

Update software. Turn on automatic updates of defensive software for all devices, applications and operating systems.



Think before you click. More than 90 percent of successful cybercrimes begin with a phishing scheme – a link or web page that looks legitimate, but is designed to steal your passwords, social security number, credit card numbers or other sensitive information. If it's a link you don't recognize, don't click.

Use strong passwords. The ideal password is at least 15 characters long and not used anywhere else.


Walton EMC Electric Rates Continue to be Favorable

What you pay for electric power is still quite reasonable.

According to the Georgia Public Service Commission's Winter 2021 Residential Rate Survey, only 12 of the 94 utilities studied posted a lower cost than Walton EMC at the 2,000 kilowatt-hour level of electricity use.

The average Walton EMC customer-owner used 2,128 kilowatt-hours in January.

The commission surveys the rates of the state's customer-owned (EMCs), government-owned and investor-owned electric companies twice yearly.

School EmPowerment Grants Top \$2 Million

The School EmPOWERment Grant program gives schools in nearby communities the chance to boost their instructional and service programs by funding worthwhile projects. Many of the projects are those that local systems don't have funds for in regular operating budgets.

The money that we distribute – over \$2 million since the program began just six short years ago – doesn't affect your power bills, either. That's because the funds are unclaimed money from former customers we can't find.

After we publish lists of these customers on our website, place legal ads and exhaust all attempts to find the owners, Georgia law allows the money to be used for community benefit.

"After providing reliable and reasonably priced electric power, serving our community is next on the list," said COO Ron Marshall. "Our School EmPOWERment Grant program is a perfect example of the cooperative principle 'concern for community."
